Our Thoughts

As the we get closer to 50 years of giving, it is time to step back and consider how we can have the greatest possible impact in light of the needs, challenges, and opportunities we have in the North Okanagan today.



Much has changed since the Community Foundation North Okanagan was started back in 1975. In the 47 years that followed we have awarded over \$12 million in grants to a wide variety of charitable and non-profit organizations doing impressive work in our region. This year alone we gave out 187 grants to 114 groups, and provided over \$2 million in support through our various granting programs.

The intention of our founders to be a 360 degree funder led to our support in a variety of areas including Arts & Culture, Education, Health & Recreation, Social Services, and the Environment, and this direction has served the community foundation and our region well. In many ways, the North Okanagan and each of the communities we serve are thriving. But progress has been, to say the least, uneven. Many families in the North Okanagan struggle daily to make ends meet as they confront the narrow range of choices their economic situation offers.

The persistence of poverty and social inequality in the North Okanagan, despite decades of dedicated efforts by nonprofits, community leaders, and local funders is causing the Community Foundation North Okanagan to reassess how best to use our resources.

Like many of you, we are asking ourselves what we can do differently to attack the root causes of poverty, food and housing insecurity, mental health challenges, and unequal access to the things that make our communities great. What can be done to shift the dynamics that reproduce and further exacerbate these challenges year after year?

History teaches us that these dynamics stem from structural and institutionally reinforced

inequality, and that shifting such dynamics will not be easy. Our board and staff feel motivated to tackle these issues with renewed vigor and to work towards making the North Okanagan a place of broadly shared prosperity and opportunity for all our residents.

Over the coming years, we would like to engage with our grantees, residents, community leaders and other foundations, funders, and subject matter experts. We would like to assess and develop priorities to guide our future work as we approach our 50th anniversary in 2025.

We are excited by the opportunity to reflect, to engage in conversation with all stakeholders, to listen, to learn, and to collaborate widely as we work together towards a healthier, more equitable environment for all in the North Okanagan.

Cultural ecological tree planting program for schools & communities

\$10,000

In spring 2023, BCSWA will be collaborating with North Okanagan schools and with Secwepemc and Syilx Knowledge Keepers, to create tree-planting events that include traditional knowledge sharing and education on nature based climate change mitigation. Eleven schools took part in 2021-2022, planting over 500 trees on school grounds, and at Pleasant Valley Wetland Heritage Park in Spallumcheen.





Fund Types

Community Funds are a flexible way to support ever changing community needs.

Donor Advised Funds direct grants to charities throughout your lifetime and create a granting plan for the future.

Term Endowments – Spend Down Funds target a specific cause and make grants over a specific period of time.

Flex Funds - Immediate Impact Funds are nonendowed funds that allow donors to set aside funds during the year and grant out those funds by the end of that year. If Endowment Funds are like savings accounts, Flex Funds are like chequing accounts.

Designated Funds - choose a favourite charity or charities to benefit not just once, but every year in perpetuity.

Scholarship Funds - support students in the region and establish the criteria for your scholarship or bursary based on academic achievement, intended field of study, or financial need.

Trail Ninjas Youth programs

\$5,000

Trail Ninjas is a community bike program offering youth ages 10-15 to learn progressive mountain bike skills, and trail etiquette, while creating opportunities for youth to build and maintain sustainable trails.

Trail Ninjas has 3 programs:

- TNT Crew consists of fun Friday Group rides and trail building.
- GTribe is an all-girls biking program with a female head coach, a progressive learning plan, access to trail building and a field trip.
- Trail Ninjas Academy is a coached program that rides 3 times a week, trail builds and prepares youth to be competition-ready or riders for life.

"The Trail Ninja Program has always wanted to create a video edit to capture the 'stoke' for biking & trail building as well as bring awareness to the program and youth in the program. This year we aimed to create a video that is 1/3 informational, 1/3 storytelling and 1/3 action. Thanks to the funding from CFNO we were able to accomplish that goal. All the Ninjas are excited for the film to drop this Spring!"

Youth Peer Wellness Program

\$20,000

The project engages youth to uplift one another to provide support and comradery. The program will use a peer-support model to help youth understand their own mental health and wellness and encourage youth to use more appropriate coping skills and techniques by building a stronger sense of belonging.

Peer-support educators will work with service providers within the North Okanagan to ensure appropriate resources are available and work with the Youth Education and Program Coordinator to facilitate educational content within the community to other youth.






Projects ranged from water conservation to community gardens, tree planting, bee keeping, hydroponic gardening and even a solar-powered robot!

Archway Society for Domestic Peace

Healing Through Horses

\$15,000

The Healing through Horses program is a trauma recovery group for women to develop skills to live with the impact of trauma and manage symptoms of post-traumatic stress. The program runs four times a year and each group has up to 10 women participate for 10-weeks.

Part I of the program teaches coping skills, boundaries and the function of feelings.

Part II teaches how to soothe the nervous system, how to re-write trauma beliefs, how to recognize archetypical behaviours/parts of self, and continues teaching life skills, such as 'letting go' and meditation.

The horses enrich the learning experience by teaching the importance of listening to the body (heart & gut), as opposed to being in the world primarily in a cognitive manner. The horses are also teaching through their body language and their personal stories. Participants tend to gravitate to a horse with a similar life story.

"The horses taught me the value, necessity, and boundaries of my "space", the space I take up. They taught me how to be present and how being present affects those around me." ~Quote from a participant
